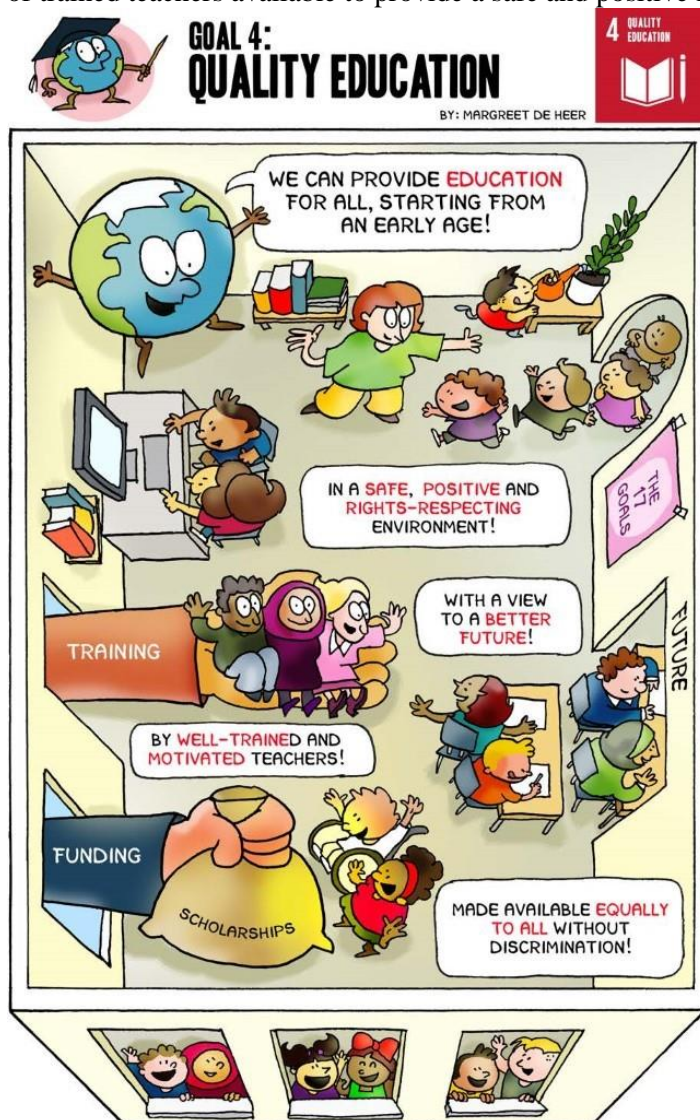

In many parts of the world, women, people with disabilities, Indigenous Peoples and victims of conflict do not have access to quality education. This goal aims to ensure everyone has access to basic education so we can understand the world around us, critically reflect on what we see, do and hear and make informed choices about our health and well-being. This goal also aims to improve school facilities, increase the number of training and vocational opportunities for people and increase the number of trained teachers available to provide a safe and positive learning environment.

For your child in elementary:

Consider sharing this World’s Largest Lesson comic, Chakra the Invincible and Mighty Girl. This comic explains some of the challenges facing children in India and the importance of equal access to education for all. Challenge your child to create their own comic about these issues in Canada or the world!

For your child in middle years:

This World’s Largest Lesson on how Everybody Wins When Girls Can Stay in School will help your child understand the term ‘gender equality’ and identify obstacles to girls’ access to education, while also recognizing the benefits of increased access to secondary education for girls. Although the lesson suggests group work, each activity can be done individually, and this lesson is targeted to children aged 11-14.

For your child in high school:

The Global Campaign for Education has a whole package of activities around this topic. For example, on Page 6-7 of the link below, students are asked to choose a country from a list that has a large refugee/migrant population and/or has experienced setbacks to ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education and promoting lifelong learning. A self-directed research project offers your child the chance to answer a series of questions about education in that country, leading to increased understanding and creating a plan to take on some of these global challenges.
