Parini Shroff, Fiction, 2023

A young Indian woman finds the false rumours that she killed her husband surprisingly useful until other women in her small village start asking for her help to get rid of their own husbands.

How can a person be at once essential and disposable? Henaway explores the local and global reality, with borders and temporary worker programs creating systems of exploitation across all industries.

9. The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World


