A MESSAGE FROM MCIC PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This has been a year of building and maintaining respectful relationships and witnessing resilience.

MCIC continues to have a good relationship with the Government of Manitoba. In January we were able to have an in person meeting with Premier Heather Stefanson and Hon. Wayne Ewasko, Minister of Education and Early Childhood Learning. We saw a \$50K increase for our members' international projects in the 2022 provincial budget, bringing the MGMGP to \$1.25M for 2022-23. At the end of March 2022, we received an additional \$150K for our members to respond to the devastation caused by the war in Ukraine. Our relationship with the Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning continues, and this year Janice Hamilton was a member of the Manitoba Education and Curriculum Advisory Panel, which met monthly to worked on a Framework for Learning and Global Competencies.

Global Affairs Canada is another key relationship of MCIC. We completed our third year of our Inspiring Action for Global Citizenship (INSPIRE) and prepared a three year cost-extension for this program, which we hope to finalize in the next fiscal year. We are very proud of the accomplishments of the Fund for Innovation and Transformation (FIT), within three years of publicly launching the program, we have signed contracts and provided funding to 54 Small and Medium-sized Organizations (SMOs) from across Canada through 5 intakes each involving a concept note and proposal. It is exciting to hear about the innovative solutions that are being tested with the local partners that are advancing gender equality, whether it is empowering persons with albinism in Sierra Leone or providing remote ultrasound for antenatal access in Ethiopia. It is an honour to witness this work in Canada and the Global South.

MCIC was pleased to host a virtual round table with Minister Gould, then Minister of International Development and our members in August 2021. Another important relationship we foster is with the Inter-Council Network of Provincial and Regional Councils (ICN). MCIC manages the FIT program on behalf of the ICN and the Alberta Council for Global Cooperation manages the SPUR Change program. This year the ICN has been rethinking public engagement approaches through a decolonial, anti-racist and feminist lens.

MCIC is proud to be a member of Cooperation Canada, and having Janice serve on their board.

Our relationship with our members is what makes MCIC special. This year we welcomed four additional members – Accountable Development Works and CARE Canada returned as members, and Opportunities International Canada, as a regular member and The Excel Empowerment Centre as an affiliate member.

We want to thank and acknowledge the many volunteers that assist MCIC in doing our work. We especially want to recognize our project review committees that review all our members' project proposals and make recommendations to the Board.

MCIC is fortunate to have a very engaged Board of Directors, and we appreciate the time they commit to the Board and Committee work. Geoff Ripat, has served six years as Board member and will be leaving the Board but continuing to serve on the Overseas Projects Committee.

We also want to give special thanks to the MCIC staff who carry out MCIC's work on a daily basis. We continue to build a great team. We have had lots of changes with our team this year, some have left us for other opportunities, and some have been on parental leave. Thankfully we have a very resilient team. This year the team worked remotely and when it was safe, some returned to work at the office.

This has been another busy and exciting year for MCIC, as we continue to work for a just world.

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BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS WITH MANITOBANS & BEYOND



OVERVIEW

This year the Inspiring Action for Global Citizenship (INSPIRE) program saw a new staff team take the reins and continue the program's mission to connect with Manitobans. The team took on new projects such as the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence videos, and revamped resources such as our Holiday Gift Guides. MCIC returned to hosting in-person events this year, while continuing to provide online opportunities for Manitobans to connect with speakers from Guatemala, Tanzania, Malawi and beyond.

LOCAL BREWS + GLOBAL VIEWS



Development and Peace spoke on peacebuilding in Myanmar. Save the Children Canada presented on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) program in Nigeria. ADRA Canada shared their albinism advocacy work in Tanzania on Early Skin Cancer Awareness, Prevention and Engagement (ESCAPE) project.









RESPECT FOR EDUCATORS AND YOUTH



Three new resources were developed and made available for educators. "Starting the SDGs" is a downloadable lesson package for an easy way for teachers to introduce the SDGs to their classroom. "Fast Fashion – Learning the Life Cycle" was designed to teach high school students about the negative impact of the mainstream fashion industry, consumerism, and sustainability. "Igbal's Ingenious Idea" targets early year students, exploring sustainable inventions.

\$20 BILL REDESIGN CHALLENGE

A **Call to Classrooms** challenge was developed to enhance outreach to youth and educators to teach the Sustainable Development Goals in an accessible, creative way. Teachers were supported with a resource package of 3 newly developed and downloadable lesson plans. Students redesigned the \$20 Canadian Bill inspired by an SDG, accompanied by a write up of their designs.

MCIC received over 70 entries across multiple school divisions. Winning designs were showcased across Manitoba and celebrated during International Development week. MCIC was able to interview and video winning recipients – an exciting opportunity to connect with our community in person. The 3-lesson resource package has been re-developed to become a "Starting the SDG's" downloadable file, a timeless resource for teachers to reference at any time in the future.

TAKE ACTION AWARDS – STUDENTS

Each year, MCIC recognizes young, global citizens in our province with an award. The **Outstanding Take Action Project Award** is given to students in the grade 12 Global Issues: Citizenship & Sustainability (40s) course, who have undertaken exceptional Take Action Projects. For their project, each student plans and implements a community-based project, responding to a variety of issues as global citizens in their schools and communities.

2. Altea Manzano, a student from St. James Collegiate, worked on a project to explain misunderstandings about feminism and intersectionality.

4. Kalkidan Mulugeta, a student from Maples MET School, raised global issues on a faith-based music blog and social media. **5. Manpinder Dhillon**, a student from Maples MET School, tackled poverty reduction in Canada, sharing information through a website.


6. Hailey Roberts, a student from St. James Collegiate, created a poster and project to educate others about the impact of cleft lip and palate health issues.

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
INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT WEEK GO FOR THE GOALS

MCIC's Book Lists for Global Readers and Students were revamped for IDW 2022 and I Love to Read month, featuring new titles like Omar El-Akkad's 2021 novel What Strange Paradise, and contemporary classics including Deborah Ellis' 2000 children's novel The Breadwinner.

We shared these book lists with every public and school library in Manitoba, over 900 in total!

Manitobans shared our Book Lists by telling us their favourite global reads, tagging their friends, and sharing our Instagram contest. Out of 76 entries, 3 winners took home McNally Robinson gift cards. Libraries shared photos of their displays for a chance to win a new book for their library.

WORLD WATER DAY

In honor of World Water Day, MCIC screened a documentary at the Park Theatre in Winnipeg called *There's Something in the Water*. The film is included on our annual documentary list and focuses on the topics of water pollution and environmental racism. We spoke about the film and the global impacts of issues around water and sanitation on CTV Morning Live

SUSTAINABLE GIFT GUIDE

MCIC launched a holiday gift guide titled A Sustainable Season: Manitoba Gifts for Global Harmony featuring Manitoba businesses who offer sustainable products and services. Fair Trade products, zero waste gifts, and Manitoba experiences were featured from businesses in Winnipeg, Brandon, Steinbach, Churchill, Niverville, Ste. Genevieve, and more. The gift guide was showcased on CTV news and Economic Development Winnipeg.



MCIC continued to engage Manitobans on global sustainability through a variety of learning resources, social media campaigns, and a mix of virtual and in-person



events. Some highlights include a fireside chat with Travel Manitoba on sustainable tourism in Manitoba, and a discussion with Winnipeg architect, Wins Bridgman, on how accessible public toilets can lead to harm reduction and socially inclusive communities.

FAIR TRADE WORKPLACE

MCIC entered its sixth year as a proud Fair Trade workplace. We engaged 130 postsecondary students through events and presentations at University of Manitoba and University of Winnipeg. We continued our involvement with the Fair Trade Winnipeg committee, helping Winnipeg thrive as a Canadian leader in total number of Fair Trade designated institutions. MCIC also proudly promoted the launch of the Fair Trade handbook featuring several Manitoba authors.



RESILIENCE OF OUR MEMBERS AND PARTNERS



ROUNDTABLE WITH MINISTER GOULD MCIC was pleased to host a virtual round table with the Hon. Karina Gould, then Minister of International Development and our members in August 2021. This was an opportunity for the Minister to hear directly from Manitobans about the work they are doing with their partners. There was a great exchange between the participants and the Minister.

CAPACITY BUILDING

MCIC offers regular training opportunities for members and partners and shares other learning resources throughout the year. This year we were very intentional in including presenters from the Global South in our sessions. Many of opportunities focused on gender equality, innovation and other SDGs.

We offered webinars on how to apply to the Community Solidarity Fund and Development Fund. In December we had a session on Gender to assist members who were planning to apply to the Theme Fund. In October we invited the Safeguarding Support Hub to present on Community Based Complaints Mechanism and in March, we had a workshop on the ethical use of images in development with presenters from ADRA and SERnina by REALgirl, Guatemala.

LUNCH AND LEARN SERIES

Our Lunch and Learn series are daytime events where members discuss the successes and challenges of their projects. Sometimes we connect this series to international days, such as our panel conversation on International Women's Day on March 8, 2022, with Winnipeg students, teachers, and community leaders from the Global South who discussed menstruation challenges and their activism to promote menstrual equality and wellbeing.

In December we organized a Lunch and Learn session on Afghanistan with Canadian Women for Women in Afghanistan, Development and Peace, and Presbyterian World Service & Development. In February we held an information session on CSW66 – The UN Commission on the Status of Women conference so people could learn how to get the most of the online conference.

MCIC teamed up with the Fund for Innovation and Transformation and had a session on Innovation on the Road to Equality in September.



MANITOBA GOVERNMENT MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM

The Manitoba Government Matching Grant Program (MGMGP) was established in 1975 by the Government of Manitoba to provide funding for international development projects delivered by Manitoba organizations and their overseas partners. Grants are awarded to successful applications through a peer-review process, carried out by committees made up of MCIC member organization representatives.

In 2021-22, MCIC distributed a total of \$1,200,000 to 51 projects in 26 countries through the MGMGP.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Projects funded through the Development, Theme, and Community Solidarity funds, ranked the top four Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) their respective project supported.



DEVELOPMENT FUND

MCIC defines development as a long-term process that promotes community involvement in designing strategies to correct and improve chronic and structural problems in all areas of individual and community life. The majority of MGMGP funds are used for this purpose. MCIC development projects reflect our Development Principles.



THEME FUND

The Theme Fund encourages MCIC member organizations to take a broader view of development projects by responding to current issues of international concern, reflected in a bi-annual theme. The 2021-22 theme is **Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women, Girls, and Gender-Nonconforming People.**



RELIEF & REHABILITATION FUND

The Relief & Rehabilitation Fund bridges the gap between the effects of a disaster and the continuation of long-term development. Projects in this category are often part of large international relief efforts, in which case MCIC directs funding to specific components as part of the wider effort. This helps ensure direct impact and visibility of the support provided by Manitobans.

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COMMUNITY SOLIDARITY FUND

The Community Solidarity Fund offers funding to Manitoba community-based charitable groups involved in international development projects. The fund is available to non-members and affiliate members of MCIC.



PROJECTS BY FUNDING TYPE





ACCOUNTABLE DEVELOPMENT WORKS • DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO | \$17,080

Educating Street Children

This project will provide funding for three years of schooling for orphans and abandoned children. This includes costs of operating our own primary school, making tuition payments for those attending other schools, university tuition, and covering the uniforms and other costs associated with school.

CANADIAN HUMANITARIAN ORGANIZATION FOR INTERNATIONAL RELIEF

• ETHIOPIA | \$8,130

Women's Micro-Entrepreneurship Initiative in Urban Ethiopia

This project aims to provide Ethiopian women living in poverty with 24 months of financial literacy and micro-entrepreneurship training and mentoring and provide interest-free small grants, so they can launch their own micro-enterprise to increase their monthly earnings by at least 50%.

CANADIAN LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF • PALESTINE | \$28,070

Gender-Responsive and Inclusive Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) in East Jerusalem and the West Bank (GRIT)

This is the third year of this project which aims to reduce poverty in West Bank and Gaza by providing vocational training to women, including women with disabilities, leading to better employment outcomes. This project will also support the development of policies and structures that will increase the gender responsiveness and inclusivity of TVET system in Palestine.

CANADIAN MULTICULTURAL DISABILITY CENTRE • ZIMBABWE | \$10,471

Construction of a Maternity Ward at the Clinic in Chirasauta Village, Chivhu in Zimbabwe

CMDCI will construct a Maternity Ward that will provide expecting mothers access to antenatal care and safe deliveries in a catchment of over 70,000 people. Such a project is necessitated by the fact that in Zimbabwe, the maternal mortality rate remains high, at 614 per 100,000 live births.



CANADIAN WOMEN FOR WOMEN IN AFGHANISTAN • AFGHANISTAN | \$3,070

Advancing Technology for Education - Darakht-e Danesh Digital Library

This project aims to ensure continued access to education and learning resources for teachers, families and women and girls in and outside of Afghanistan as they face further barriers to education due to change in government, economic upheaval, fleeing the country and resettlement.

CANADIAN CATHOLIC ORGANIZATION FOR DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE • SIERRA LEONE | \$32,160

Enhancing Women's Social, Economic and Political Empowerment in 3 Chiefdoms in Kenema District

This project aims to raise women's awareness, give them the means to better organize themselves and build their capacity to position themselves in strategic decision-making structures and processes at varying levels in socio-economic and political spheres. The project will empower 175 women in Kenema District who are facing limited access to resources and decision-making, illiteracy, and poverty.

CODE

• LIBERIA | \$7,940

Reading Liberia 20/22

This is the second year of this project, Reading Liberia 20/22, which serves 180 educators and 4,000 primary school students in Bomi, Margibi and Montserrado counties through professional development; culturally relevant books and learning materials; an after-school program for over-age girls; and mobile learning labs. Athome learning kits for over-girls will be provided.

CO-OPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION OF CANADA

• ETHIOPIA | \$13,161

Empowering Women through the Gender Model Family Approach

Empowering Women through the Gender Model Family Approach is a gendertransformative methodology for community mobilization in the Amhara region of Ethiopia, which aims to address the unequal power relations between women and men and promote a longer-term transformation of harmful gender norms.

CUSO INTERNATIONAL

• TANZANIA | \$11,441

Tanzania Small Business Hubs

The objective of Cuso International's Tanzania Small Business Hubs project is to support the strengthening of women and youth led small and medium sized enterprises to overcome barriers to growing their businesses by providing business facilities, access to technology, and market expertise in Tanzania.

DOCTORS WITHOUT BORDERS/MÉDECINS SANS FRONTIÈRES • COLOMBIA | \$107,719

Nariño Project

This project aims to ensure, in terms of coverage and quality, the continuity of healthcare for the nearly 70,000 people affected by the internal armed conflict in Colombia's Telembí Triangle through improving the conditions of access to health services, considering community strategies for coping with the health-disease cycle.

EMMANUEL INTERNATIONAL CANADA TANZANIA | \$6,935

Health for Development Project, Iringa, Tanzania

The project aims to improve community health in eight villages so that they can live more resilient productive lives and remove themselves from the poverty trap they are in. Working through the village churches, community groups will promote and demonstrate improved health practices thereby enabling them to raise their living conditions.

HEALTH PARTNERS INTERNATIONAL OF CANADA ETHIOPIA | \$9,921

Addressing Harmful Traditional Practices against Women and Girls in Ethiopia

This project aims to reduce harmful traditional practices (HTPs) against women and girls in the Minjar Shenkora district of the Amhara Region of Ethiopia. The project will focus on raising awareness among local communities on HTPs and their health complications and consequences. The project will also contribute to improving the availability and quality of health services needed for HTP victims. At the same time, the project aims to improve the capacity of local community leaders to monitor and implement appropriate strategies and preventive measures against HTPs beyond the duration of the project. The project expects to reach 7,000 community members (including 5,000 women and girls) over its 2-year timeframe.

HOPE INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY HAITI | \$10,943

Agricultural Revitalization in Haiti

This project aims to improve food security and income for farming families in Duchity, Grande'Anse, an area hit by a 7.2 magnitude earthquake in 2021. Farmers will be supported to establish cropping systems that are resilient and provide sustainable income. The Kreyol Garden method prioritizes climate resiliency, soil improvement and biodiversity.

IDE CANADA

• CAMBODIA | \$40,751

Mushroom Grow Box

This project aims to prototype and test innovative zero-waste mushroom cultivation kits to improve food security, nutrition, and income-earning opportunities for Cambodian farmers, especially women. This project will benefit five farmers and their families and will demonstrate a scalable model for broader expansion.

INTER PARES

• EL SALVADOR | \$9,157

Strategic Interventions to Build Momentum on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights in El Salvador

This project aims to address barriers faced by women and girls in achieving their sexual and reproductive health and asserting their rights. This year 1,720 women and girls supported to assert their agency and bodily autonomy, control their fertility, and understand their rights, ultimately being able to determine the course of their lives.



KIDS INITIATIVEKENYA | \$7,221

Borokwony Women's Group - Chicken Project (Lemolo B)

This project aims to enhance food security. A chicken incubator, eggs, and feed will be used to hatch over 1,000 chicks every 21 days. Chicks will be used for egg production, while the incubator produces more. Chicks will also be sold to those who want to start a chicken project, and the remaining will be kept maturing for future sale.

KUWALA CHRISTIAN GIRLS SCHOOL

• MALAWI | \$26,311

Creating Opportunities for Young Girls

This project aims to provide an alternative and practical path for post-secondary success amongst 60 female students in Form 4 through a non-traditional,

extracurricular vocational training program. These readily transferable skills will open doors to post graduation trades certification, job opportunities and self-employment options. This is a unique and innovative offering in Malawi and specifically with girls.

MAKE MUSIC MATTER

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO | \$5,250

Healing in Harmony Mobile at Maison Dorcas

This project will bring the Healing in Harmony music therapy program to treat young women, girls and men using a mobile approach, the therapy will reach more rural areas where mental traumas are high, and the treatments are non-existent. This will be the first year of the two-year project.

MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE

• LAOS | \$130,000

Strengthening Land Governance for Sustainable Development

This is the third year of this project which aims to increase participants' understanding of land laws and mechanisms for addressing land disputes in Pek District and increases the capacity of conflict resolution institutions at the village and district level. Participants include 98 district government officers, 420 village leaders, and 10,800 laypeople.

MENNONITE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATES

NICARAGUA | \$57,758

Women and Rural Entrepreneurship

This project aims to implement a capacity building program for rural women living in Matagalpa, Jinotega, Nueva Segovia, Madriz and Estelí, Northern areas of Nicaragua. The project will directly engage sixty-five (65) women in leadership and entrepreneurship training workshops, and will provide them with access to coaching, tailored support and equipment to accelerate their business development.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE

• MALAWI | \$2,100

Desks to Support a Girl-Positive Classroom Environment

The project will support the physical infrastructure of Nasenga Primary School by improving the learning environment for girls through increased availability of good quality desks for female students. The project aims to continue to focus on addressing inequality, particularly for girls in school, and to prioritize initiatives that support community ownership and build capacity of the local education authority.

PRESBYTERIAN WORLD SERVICE & DEVELOPMENT • AFGHANISTAN | \$8,885

Girls Education Program

This project aims to empower young girls in three districts within three provinces of Afghanistan through quality education in 20 schools and two community-based schools. It increases girls' enrollment, decreases dropout rates, builds teacher and school management capacity, engages communities, and protects students and teachers from COVID-19. Direct beneficiaries in year 2: 10,983.

PRIMATES WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND • SOUTH SUDAN | \$12,996

Supporting Local Entrepreneurship for Resilience

This project aims to draw 200 small-scale entrepreneurs in Yei, South Sudan, from the returnee (refugees returning from Uganda and Congo) and host community households, will be supported with vocational training (tailoring, hairdressing, and catering for women, and carpentry for young men), tools and accompaniment to assist them re-establish their local enterprises.

SAVE THE CHILDREN CANADA

COLOMBIA | \$14,889

Building Safe Spaces for Girls and Improving Education in the Colombian-Venezuelan Border Region

This project aims to improve the realization of the right to safe, quality, genderresponsive learning opportunities for girls affected by crisis along the Colombia-Venezuela Border, through increased equitable access to safe, quality, genderresponsive education and learning.

SEEDCHANGE

TIMOR-LESTE | \$7,300

Seed and Food Security in Highland Timor-Leste

This is the third year of this project which aims to establish Community Seed Banks to build up the food and wild food-based biodiversity of the food supply in the isolated communities and degraded hillsides of Timor-Leste. This will increase diversity of field crops and vegetable varieties, in support of greater food security in the highlands of Timor-Leste, improve capacity of communities to manage seed resources, based at small Community Seed Banks, and promote a focus on farmer based seed programming as a core of improving the food security for Timor-Leste.

TEARFUND CANADA TANZANIA | \$35,125

Chamwino Conservation Agriculture Project

This project focus on Conservation Agriculture and Village Savings and Loans, empowering participants to provide for their families and better the environment. The ultimate outcome of the program is centered on improved food security and sustainable livelihoods for smallholder farming households in Chamwino and Dodoma City Districts of Tanzania.

UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA EL SALVADOR | \$16,477

This is the second year of this project which aims to provide opportunities for agricultural families from the rural areas of Cabañas to learn theoretical and practical agroecological principles, establishing a culture of sustainable agroecological practices and food systems, and moving away from harmful practices. To ensure long-term sustainability and effectiveness, all project activities will use popular education tools, as well as a gender approach and participative democracy in community life.

UNICEF CANADA

• GHANA | \$45,977

Undaunted

The project is being implemented in five districts across three regions, reaching a total of 30,000 adolescent girls and 23,000 adolescent boys. The project takes a "whole-school approach" to support adolescent girls living in disadvantaged districts to complete junior high school.

WINNIPEG ROTARY CLUB COMMUNITY SERVICE FUND

SOUTH AFRICA | \$7,924

Beyond Subsistence: Moving women and men from dependency to dignity through market gardens in South Africa

The project will take 30 people of various ages and gender from the Inanda Valley, KwaZulu Natal, South Africa through a 1-year (2 growing seasons) food security program called "Beyond Subsistence". Through changing mindsets from subsistence to business mindsets, and using permaculture farming methodologies, each person will result in having a vegetable garden that produces enough food to consume as well as to sell to generate an income and savings, and thereby improve household wellbeing in a dignified sustainable manner.

WORLD RENEW MOZAMBIQUE | \$10,671

Enhancing Wellbeing of Children and Health Status of Pregnant and Lactating Mothers

This is the third year of this Scale-Up Nutrition project, its objective is to improve the wellbeing of children through improved feeding practices and nutritional/health status of mothers and children under 2 and strengthens health services in 12 villages in Mozambique. The project targets 1,000 households, including 1,000 mothers and 2,000 children under two.

WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE OF CANADA SRI LANKA | \$43,523

Empowerment of Marginalized Communities through Inclusive Entrepreneurship (EMCIE)

The EMCIE project seeks to improve access to markets, financing, training, and mentorship for entrepreneurs in Sri Lanka, particularly women, youth, LGBTQ+ people, people with disabilities and war-affected people. This initiative is part of WUSC's IGNI+E Partner Innovation Fund which supports local organizations to promote innovative, inclusive, gender-responsive initiatives.

Access to Justice for Adolescent Girls Who Are Hard-of-Hearing

This project aims to enhance the capacity and gender-responsiveness of national institutions and professionals of Disability Support Associations in Mozambique, specific to sign language contextualization of the NICHD Protocol while working to enhance capacities of adolescent girls who are hard-of-hearing to practice improved Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights behaviors and skills.

DD Classroom Pilot Project and Learning Baskets Plus

This project aims to offer virtual classes for Afghan girls beginning with a pilot for 60 grade 7 students using a video-based online learning approach through synchronous classes taught by 6 (5 female) recently unemployed Afghan certified teachers. The girls will receive learning materials along with life-saving supplies delivered to their homes.

DOCTORS WITHOUT BORDERS/MÉDECINS SANS FRONTIÈRES • HAITI | \$20,000

Artibonite Adolescent Health and Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV) Care

This project aims to improve the health status of more than 6,300 adolescents and SGBV survivors through providing free-of-charge quality multidisciplinary healthcare; increasing community awareness of Adolescent Sexual Health and SGBV needs and working with the Ministry of Health to offer quality healthcare in public health facilities.

HOPE INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY • HONDURAS | \$20,000

Healthy Woman Project

This project aims to provide 1,500 low-income women, living in 21 rural communities in northern Comayagua County, Honduras, with access to comprehensive medical services through 10 medical brigades that provide individualized health attention and a PAP smear cancer screening exam for early cervical cancer detection, infections or diseases. Treatment and/or referral to appropriate medical centers will be provided to women diagnosed with cervical cancer.

Healing in Harmony in Syria-Music Therapy for Internally Displaced Young Women and Girls Healing in Harmony Gaziantep is a one-year project providing psychosocial support to 160 internally displaced young women, girls, and gender nonconforming people. Through an innovative approach to music therapy, the caregivers and their communities will participate to reduce trauma, build educational opportunities, and foster a culture of empathy.

MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO | \$20,000

Empowering Women Situation Rooms to promote peace, health and nutrition in DRC

This project will empower Women Situation Room (WSR) members with the skills and knowledge to promote peace and improved health within their communities. This will be done through a combination of women-led workshops and community sensitization efforts. A total of 176 individuals in South Kivu, North Kivu, Kwilu, and Kasai, DRC will benefit.

OPPORTUNITY INTERNATIONAL CANADA • GHANA | \$20,000

Empowering Women in Ghana through Mentorship, Financial Inclusion and Gender Equality

The Financial Inclusion for Enterprise Development (FINEDEV) project provides access to financial services for women-owned, small businesses, in Ghana. FINEDEV innovated to empower women through economic inclusion, including designing a Mentorship Program. A cohort in 2022 would be a country-wide initiative and reach 250 direct beneficiaries and 2,049 indirect beneficiaries.

JANE GOODALL INSTITUTE OF CANADA • SENEGAL | \$20,000

Building Community Resilience & Gender Equality in Senegal

The project promotes gender equality as key to improving the resilience of rural communities to climate change, in the Kedougou region of Senegal. This is achieved through gender-sensitive climate-smart agriculture, women's increased role in decision-making for sustainable livelihoods, and the adoption of forest protection practices by local government and communities.

WORLD RENEW

• HONDURAS | \$20,000

Empowering Women and Girls for Improved Child Health – Phase 2

This project aims to improve child health in 10 Honduran communities in Choluteca y Valle by empowering mothers and fathers, including teen parents, improving nutrition, and addressing machismo. The project will reach 1,560 participants, including 881 women, 679 men, and 600 children under 5 years old (306 girls, 294 boys).

The Microfinance project in UVIRA -2, is a long-term solution to poverty for a selected number of women and young single mothers in the city of Uvira. The project gives start-up capital to individuals to start local trading in local open markets. With previous experience, participants were able to provide for their own families and relatives. This is a revolving loan model which has changed the lives of some beneficiaries in Uvira. This project will train 100 women to launch their small businesses.

TEMPLE BAPTIST CHURCH • TANZANIA | \$6,000

Entrepreneurship Project

The proposed project aims to empowers the disadvantaged (mostly women) through entrepreneurship education and group-based loans. Loans are given to a group and the funds can be used as one small business or they can be split amongst the group members for various small businesses.

THE EXCEL EMPOWERMENT CENTRE • SOUTH SUDAN | \$8,000

Mental Health and Wellness Workshops

The project is designed to focus on wellness of the local community specially women and children. The project will cover several wellness workshops on the following topics: COVID19 awareness and basic materials supply like masks & sanitizers; educational workshop on mental & emotional health, focus on depression & PTSD; prevention of other communicable diseases like tuberculosis, Chlorea, malaria etc.; and nutrition education to lactating mothers and young mothers.

TOGETHER FOR A STRONG WORLD INC. • DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO | \$6,000

Women Empowerment Through Agriculture

The project will lift women from poverty by becoming self-sufficient by providing them with agriculture tools and seeds so that they can reach the high productivity and be able to feed their families. Women will learn from other women some techniques on how to grow crops.





Testing Project : 'Leaving No One Behind': Empowering Persons with Albinism, Particularly Women and Adolescent Girls in Rural Regions of Sierra Leone

University of the Fraser Valley

Local Partner: Albinism Royal Foundation

In Sierra Leone, University of Fraser Valley and Albinism Royal Foundation are using participatory tools and approaches such as photovoice and digital storytelling to reduce stigma around albinism. Part of their innovation testing includes training people with albinism (PWA) in livelihoods skills (sewing, tailoring and weaving) so they can then train others.

PWA carrying out training with others in the community (including non-PWA) can have an enormous positive impact on socio-cultural norms, stigmas, and biases. In a context where PWA are highly stigmatized and viewed as 'worthless' by others, leading and collaborating like this is positive and significant.

Testing results are showing that women, girls and family members are being empowered to be leaders, role models and advocates for equality.

Community digital story telling sessions had a large impact for both men and women participants. This was the first time they were asked to share their personal stories, and to have others place value on them.

The testing project has helped the Albinism Royal Foundation garner visibility in the community and with the government around PWA, and has prompted the government to provide additional support. Learn more here.



Testing Project : Improving Maternal, Newborn and Child Health Outcomes by Using Innovative and Community-centric Approaches

OGOW Health

Local Partner: World Vision Somalia

OGOW Health and World Vision Somalia tested an innovative solution aimed at improving health outcomes for Somali children using an electronic medical record and information management system. It also sought to instill trust in the medical system by giving mothers and caregivers agency over their child's health. OGOW's platform (easy-touse in the Somali language) offers a personalized immunization schedule for each family member's vaccination needs and individualized reminders on when and where to go for services. OGOW is also testing a dashboard to help administrators and governments access real-time, consolidated data on various health indicators, Learn more here.

By empowering girls, women, healthcare administrators and the government with greater access to information through technology tools and resources this is ultimately improving their standard of care, and further building trust between patients and healthcare systems. It's also leading to more data-driven planning and decision making aimed at achieving desired health outcomes for all involved



Testing Project : Remote Ultrasound Capacity Building for Antenatal Access

Canadian Physicians for Aid and Relief

Local Partner: The Ethiopian Ministry of Health and CPAR Ethiopia

In partnership with the University of Saskatchewan, Canadian Physicians for Aid and Relief (CPAR) designed and tested a capacity building program that aimed to increase access to obstetrical care in rural Ethiopia by bringing potentially life-saving prenatal ultrasound imaging – and associated diagnostic, preventative and therapeutic capacities to pregnant women in remote areas of Ethiopia.

The goal was to test the delivery of synchronous ultrasound services in selected Health Centers for pregnant women, who are unable to access regular obstetrical antenatal care by training health officers, nurses and/or midwives to use synchronous ultrasound technology in consultation with an Obstetrician located in a regional hospital.

Both healthcare workers and patients reported excellent uptake and response. The cost-free and accessible nature of these services helps women avoid costly and laborious trips to specialized hospitals in urban areas. Learn more here.

Management prepared these summary financial statements using the following criteria:


- a. the summary financial statements include a statement for each statement included in the audited financial statements;
