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A MESSAGE FROM

MCIC PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

INSPIRING INSIGHT AND INNOVATION

This was the year that we finally showcased *A Better World is InSight* in Manitoba.

InSight was a joint initiative with the Alberta and Saskatchewan councils. The project launched in Alberta in January 2020 and then went into storage for almost two years. InSight utilized an innovative 6-meter cylinder that provided audiences of all ages with an immersive, one-of-a-kind, 360° video experience. We were excited to have it installed in Manitoba in May-June 2022 and January - March 2023 and have over 3,000 Manitobans experience it.

Manitobans continue to support the global work of our members and their partners in the Global South, last year contributing \$31.2 million to their international work. This year the Government of Manitoba increased its support to MCIC for our members' international work to \$1.25 million and provided an additional \$200,000 for our members to respond to the flooding in Pakistan, in addition to the \$150,000 we received at the end of March 2022 to respond to the war in Ukraine. Thanks to the Government of Manitoba, this year MCIC distributed a record \$1.6 million to 59 projects in 32 countries through the Manitoba Government Matching Grant Program.

After a two-year absence, we were delighted to return to the Rotunda of the Manitoba Legislative building to kick off International Development Week's Go for the Goals. The Hon. Wayne Ewasko, Minister of Education and Early Childhood Learning, proclaimed International Development Week (IDW) in Manitoba and circulated the Proclamation to all schools in the province. Prior to IDW, the Minister recognized the Day for International Education by participating in the InSight experience at Collège Churchill High School in Winnipeg.

Our Inspiring Action for Global Citizenship program that we refer to as INSPIRE had a great year. We were thrilled to have James Kornelsen join the team as Director of Engagement and Learning in May. The INSPIRE team

tried a number of new things, such as the Climate Chats during COP27, and they took time to analyse the results and make adjustments. The programs we do in schools were in big demand as in person workshops and professional development events for educators. The team organized 407 public engagement events and directly reached over 8,000 Manitobans in at least 38 communities in the province. We got excellent media coverage of our events and initiatives this year – with CTV, CBC, Global and the Winnipeg Free Press as well as other community media. Our social media continued to be strong. In March 2023, we were pleased to sign a three-year cost extension with Global Affairs Canada for our Inspiring Action for Global Citizenship program.

It was another successful year for the Fund for Innovation and Transformation (FIT). As this was the fourth year of the program, it was exciting to learn about the results and stories from the innovative solutions that have been tested to advance gender equality and empower women and girls. It has been a privilege to be able to virtually visit and hear from participants, local partners, and the Canadian small and medium-sized organizations (SMOs). This year and next year are about sharing the results with others in the sector and the Global South. FIT and SMOs will continue to present at conferences and other opportunities. The fit-fit.ca website is loaded with information about the testing – you can view reports and videos of many of the projects. We encourage you to check it out.

In January, MCIC welcomed Patricia Peña, Assistant Deputy Minister, Partnerships for Development Innovations at Global Affairs Canada, to Winnipeg. This was an opportunity for her to meet the international cooperation community in Manitoba and learn more about the work we are doing with our INSPIRE and FIT programs. We truly appreciate the support we get from Global Affairs for this work.

The MCIC team is a large one, and we would not be able to do this work without all of them. They inspire us and

provide insight and innovation to working for a just world. We want to thank our members and their partners who work in solidarity to respond to the needs of our global communities, over the long term and when disaster strikes. This is not easy work but so important for our inter-connected world.

MCIC is fortunate to have a very engaged and dedicated board of directors, and we appreciate the time they provide for the governance of MCIC. We want to provide a special thanks to Krista Waring who will be leaving the Board after six years. Krista has been an active participant on many of our committees.

We have other volunteers that serve on our project review committees. We want to thank them for the many hours they spend reviewing project applications.

It is an honour to work with our passionate and committed staff who do the day-to-day work of MCIC. They are the ones who make our programs the success that they are. We want to thank you all for being an important part of MCIC.

As we are on the eve of our 50th year, we hope you will enjoy reviewing this annual report and be inspired by the work, and the insight and innovation of which we have been a part.

INSPIRING INSIGHT WITH MANITOBANS & BEYOND



OVERVIEW

What inspires our work? People. At the beginning of this 2022-23 fiscal year, MCIC began planning for in-person events after pandemic restrictions lifted. One of the first was a Queer Indigenous Solidarity event, featuring MCIC members and partners whose voices are supporting gender equality around the world. Their message? "What we want in our society is more love, and less hate."

The second was setting up *A Better World Is InSight* 360-degree video installation at The Forks and Red River College Polytechnic, in which Manitobans witnessed four different global stories of sustainable development. InSight would go on to engage thousands more in Manitoba schools, inspiring students and teachers to take action on the Sustainable Development Goals.

MCIC enjoyed an amazing year of public engagement as people came together both online and in-person to work together for a better world.

From Pukatawagan to Plum Coulee, whether in schools, or at sustainability events, through Fair Trade groups, training activities, or events with members and partners, MCIC directly reached and engaged with at least **38 communities** within Manitoba and many others outside Manitoba.

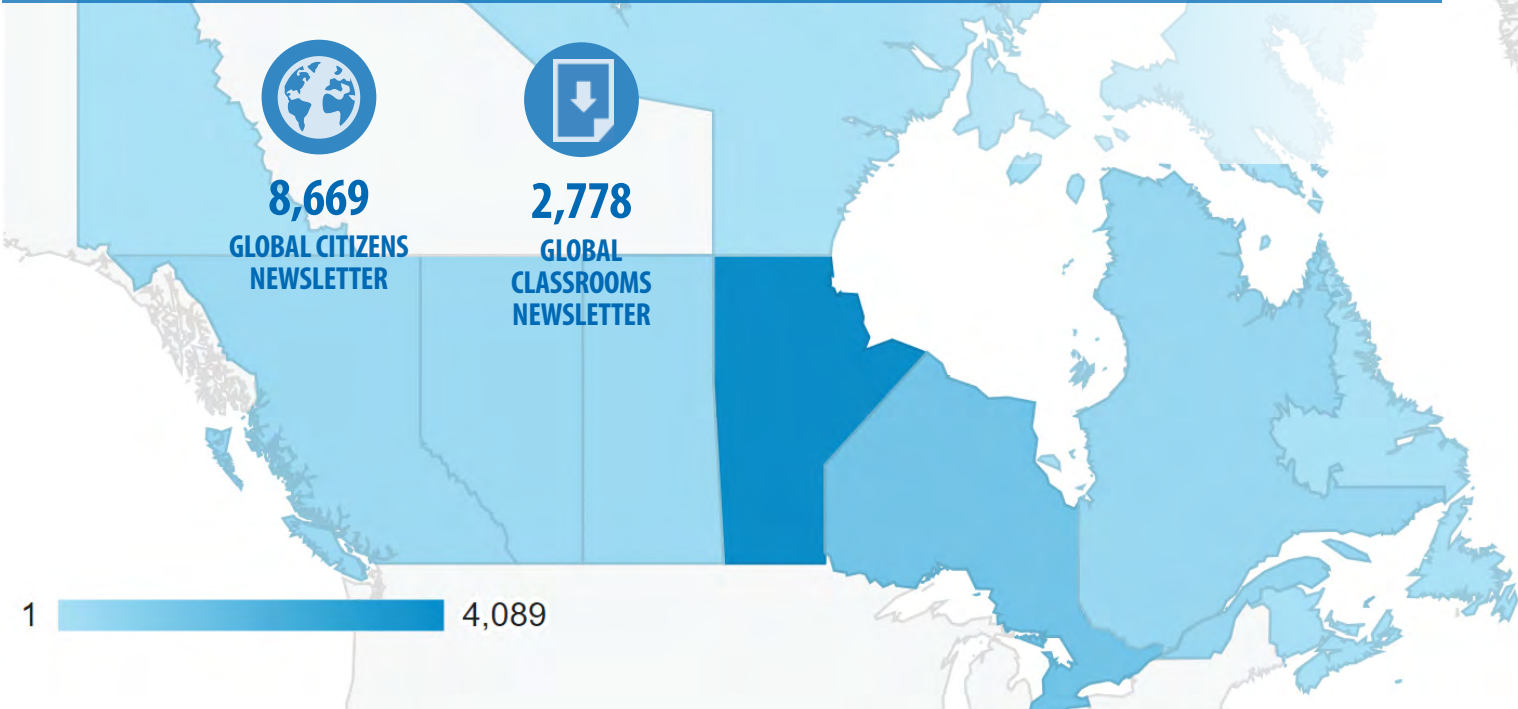

A BETTER WORLD IS INSIGHT

InSight was a joint project with the Alberta and Saskatchewan councils. The project first launched in Alberta in January 2020 and then went into storage for almost two years due to COVID-19. We received it in Manitoba in April 2022 for three months and then in January 2023 for another three months. In the spring InSight was set up at The Forks and Red River College Polytechnic.





From January to March, we were able to bring InSight into five different schools, allowing classes of Manitoba students to experience this incredible and immersive global education experience. Youth from grades 1-12 virtually travelled to regions in the Global South to help them understand challenges that people face around the world, and then start to think about innovative solutions while participating in the accompanying workshops for each of the four film selections. Over 3,000 Manitobans experienced InSight.

TAKE ACTION AWARDS 2022 – STUDENTS

Each year, MCIC recognizes young, global citizens in our province with an award. The **Outstanding Take Action Project Award** is presented to students in the Global Issues: Citizenship & Sustainability (40S) course, who have undertaken exceptional Take Action Projects. For their project, each student plans and implements a community-based project, responding to a variety of issues in their schools and communities.

This year we presented awards to six outstanding students.



Anne Gonzales, Daniel McIntyre Collegiate Institute, organized a Koats for Kids collection drive at their school while learning about child poverty within Winnipeg and the difficult nature of our winter season.

Jessica Hossack, Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School, raised money for pediatric brain cancer in memory of Keira Bond, a young ringette player who passed away from an aggressive form of brain cancer.

Sunshine Levasseur, St James Collegiate, organized a week of action and fundraiser to bring attention to the ongoing genocide of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two-Spirit individuals in Canada. All proceeds raised were donated to Drag the Red Winnipeg.

Julia Lucier, St. James Collegiate, shared attention to the issues of human trafficking, and how that affects Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two-Spirit people through displaying a poster at their school.

Divya Sharma, Fort Richmond Collegiate, documented a day in the life of someone in Rajpura, India to share a real and relatable perspective from another culture and country.

Paige Sokolski, Springfield Collegiate Institute, created a community vegetable garden at Springfield Collegiate Institute to promote climate awareness, grow healthy foods, and strengthen the community spirit.

Cynthia Tran, Sisler High School, created connections between CancerCare Manitoba and Main Street Project to provide mobile cancer screening and self-screening education to unhoused people in Winnipeg.

TEACHER PD DAYS

Sustainability education is becoming increasingly important to educators. MCIC aims to give teachers the tools that they need to confidently teach topics related to sustainability and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in their classrooms. MCIC receives requests from principals, teachers, divisional staff, and curriculum consultants to provide these training sessions. In 2022-23, staff provided **seven PD opportunities to a total of 83 teachers**, which will have an impact on roughly 5,000 students across Manitoba.



GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP AWARDS – EDUCATORS

Each year, MCIC recognizes Manitoba teachers and administrators who are leaders in promoting global citizenship in their classrooms, schools and communities.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT WEEK

GO FOR THE GOALS



International Development Week 2023 featured a long-awaited return to an in-person kick off event at the Manitoba Legislative Building. The event featured a spoken word performance by Aylin Kohan, a Winnipeg high school student, and stories of members' global programming for a more just and sustainable world.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT WEEK

In the weeks leading up to, during, and following IDW 2023, MCIC engaged Canadians through numerous activities:

- **IDW 2023 Kick Off Event** (in-person at the Manitoba Legislative Building) – 65 people
- **International Day of Education**, January 24th, brought the Manitoba Minister of Education and Early Childhood Learning to Collège Churchill High School, host of the InSight installation, one week prior to IDW
- **IDW Library Campaign** packages were sent to **785 school libraries** and **125 public libraries** - **135 downloads** of the booklists and multimedia list
- **Special Local Brews + Global Views**
Dr Kawser Ahmed featured MCIC member, Kuwala Christian Girls School in Malawi (online). This event was viewed over 700 times.

This year MCIC tried something new! Staff attended Winnipeg ICE hockey game, set up a booth and encouraged fans to #GoForTheGoals by creating a video to appear between periods on the jumbotron. There were 100 people who visited the booth to spin the SDG wheel and win a prize. Meanwhile, about 2000 people got to see MCIC represented on the large screen and hear the announcer give a short message about International Development Week.



VOICES FOR CHANGE

Voices for Change is an annual spoken word program organized by MCIC. Selected Manitoba youth, with a passion for writing and performance, participate in hands on workshops with professional poet and artist, Steve Locke, to write and record an original poem about a global issue of their choice. To wrap up the project, students create a performance piece, which is professionally filmed and debuted during International Development Week in February.

This year we selected one student to participate in our Voices for Change program. Aylin is a high school student in Winnipeg who grew up in Iran. She believes

that it is important for youth to have a voice on global issues. She is passionate about performing arts and self-expression and wants to share her perspective and her love for her country with others. "Someday" is an expressive piece through which Aylin reflects on her home country of Iran and explores themes of identity and human rights.

Aylin premiered "Someday" at MCIC's International Development Week Kick Off 2023 to an audience of guests, MLAs, and dignitaries held at the Manitoba Legislative Building. Since participating in Voices for Change, Aylin has been invited to perform and speak about her poem in Manitoba and nationally.

CLIMATE CHATS

Inspired by the conversations during COP27 in Egypt, MCIC organized and hosted a series of conversations over three weeks which featured local and global voices. Held virtually, we hosted Climate Chats throughout November, asking seven experts and organizers on the ground to share how climate change is affecting their communities—from Pakistan to Haiti to here in Manitoba—and what's being done to adapt.

Our guests included: Tassaduq Hussain, Community World Services Asia; Lydia Carpenter, Hollistic Management Farmer of Luna Field Farm, Manitoba; Léo Tremblay, Médecins Sans Frontières; Katherine Whitecloud, Dakota Knowledge Keeper; Dr. Kawser Ahmed, University of Winnipeg; Ramesh Babu, The Evangelical Fellowship of India Commission on Relief and Florence Nduku, Canadian Foodgrains Bank, Kenya.

PLASTIC FREE JULY

In July, MCIC recommitted to limiting our plastic use by joining the Plastic Free July movement - a global initiative to encourage and inspire people to minimize their single-use plastic. On Instagram, we issued weekly challenges alongside useful tips and rounded off the month with an article on our website and a one-of-a-kind printable monthly calendar that includes our plastic free challenges and advice to help us go plastic-free any month!



PATHWAYS TO SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES AN EVENING WITH CLAYTON THOMAS-MÜLLER

The 2023 author event was held on a very cold evening in February, at The Park Theatre. This public multimedia event featured Clayton Thomas-Müller, an Indigenous climate activist and best-selling Manitoba author.

Clayton touched on issues relating to the Sustainable Development Goals, such as Climate Action, Gender Equality, Sustainable Cities and Communities, and others. More than 60 Manitobans braved the cold weather to attend this event and engage on these topics through their insightful comments and questions.

TEC-VOC FAIR TRADE SCHOOL EVENT

MCIC was thrilled to attend Tec-Voc's Farm & Fair Longest Table event in November. This annual event celebrated Tec-Voc's designation as a Fair Trade school, by bringing together local and Fair Trade food and the community. MCIC was grateful to be invited and to be able to sit together at such a lovely and longest fair table.

MEMBERS LEARNING AND SHARING



CAPACITY SHARING

When MCIC offered to hold an ICN training on anti-oppression skills in education and advocacy there was a good response among member staff based in Manitoba doing public engagement. Based on recent ICN research and collaboration, MCIC organized a 1.5-day training entitled **Towards a More Decolonial, Anti-racist and Feminist Public Engagement**. The two sessions were held in January and March, involving 18 participants from eight different organizations. A local instructor, Kathleen Wilson, who is a specialist in decolonization and anti-racism facilitated both sessions.

MCIC hosted two **Lunch & Learn** events during the year, both in collaboration with the FIT team. One featured Make Music Matter in June 2022 that shared effective ways of reaching out to men and boys toward gender equality in the context of trauma healing in the DRC. The second featured iDE in January 2023 and the testing of marketing strategies for women farmers in Nepal. The two events had a combined 80 participants.

MCIC organized **orientation and information sessions** for organizations wanting to apply for Community Solidarity or other MGMGP funding. In September we organized a **Learning by Sharing** virtual event with members to discuss their gender equality theme fund projects. Members shared their lessons learned and good practices.

LOCAL BREWS + GLOBAL VIEWS

Staff organized three different Local Brews & Global Views events to feature member programming on sustainable development. In May, featured member Inter Pares and their partnership with Center for Women's Health to address teen pregnancy in the Philippines. In September, MCC program staff Alison Enns shared about the peacebuilding work being done through Women's Situation Rooms in the DRC, and in February Mark Kinsel from Kuwala Christian Girls School talked about the importance of girls' education in reducing poverty and food insecurity in Malawi. The three events had a combined audience of 48 participants and post-event videos sent out involved about 850 more viewers.

OTHER PUBLIC EVENTS

For International Women's Day 2023, staff organized a special Lunch & Learn event to highlight recent events and dire circumstances for women in Afghanistan through the voices of Afghan women, as well as other volunteers and staff of Canadian Women for Women in Afghanistan. A short, action-oriented YouTube video with content from pre-recorded interviews was created to engage Manitobans with the key message: "Do not forget about women in Afghanistan."

Queer Indigenous Solidarity: Voices from Latin America

In June, MCIC collaborated with Inter Pares and Dignity Network Canada for an engaging in person event. The panel discussion centered on the intersectional challenges faced by the Queer Indigenous community in Latin America. Olowaili Green Santacruz is an Indigenous Guna woman, lesbian activist, and filmmaker from Colombia. Mónica Chub Caal and Fernando Alvarez both traveled from Guatemala. Mónica is a Maya Q'eqchi woman, and is a prominent Trans activist and organizer. Fernando is a Maya K'ichè sexual dissident and organizer, whose group Red Multicultural de Mujeres Trans (Multicultural Network of Trans Women) brings together largely Indigenous Trans women from across Guatemala.



MANITOBA GOVERNMENT MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM

The Manitoba Government Matching Grant Program (MGMGP) was established in 1975 by the Government of Manitoba to provide funding for international development projects delivered by Manitoba organizations and their overseas partners. Grants are awarded to successful applications through a peer-review process, carried out by committees made up of MCIC member organization representatives.

In 2022-23, MCIC distributed a total of **\$1,600,000** to **59 projects** in **32 countries** through the MGMGP.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Projects funded through the Development, Theme, and Community Solidarity funds ranked the top four Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in their respective project supported.

Among 46 projects, **SDG 5: Gender Equality**, **SDG 2: Zero Hunger**, **SDG 1: No Poverty**, **SDG 3: Good Health**, and **SDG 4: Quality Education** were indicated most frequently.



DEVELOPMENT FUND

MCIC defines development as a long-term process that promotes community involvement in designing strategies to correct and improve chronic and structural problems in all areas of individual and community life. The majority of MGMGP funds are used for this purpose. MCIC development projects reflect MCIC's Development Principles.



THEME FUND

The Theme Fund encourages MCIC member organizations to take a broader view of development projects by responding to current issues of international concern, reflected in a bi-annual theme. The 2022-23 theme is **Climate-Resilient Food Systems for Health and Nutrition**.



RELIEF & REHABILITATION FUND

The Relief & Rehabilitation Fund bridges the gap between the effects of a disaster and the continuation of long-term development. Projects in this category are often part of large international relief efforts, in which case MCIC directs funding to specific components as part of the wider effort. This helps ensure direct impact and visibility of the support provided by Manitobans.



COMMUNITY SOLIDARITY FUND

The Community Solidarity Fund offers funding to Manitoba community-based charitable groups involved in international development projects. The fund is available to non-members and affiliate members of MCIC.

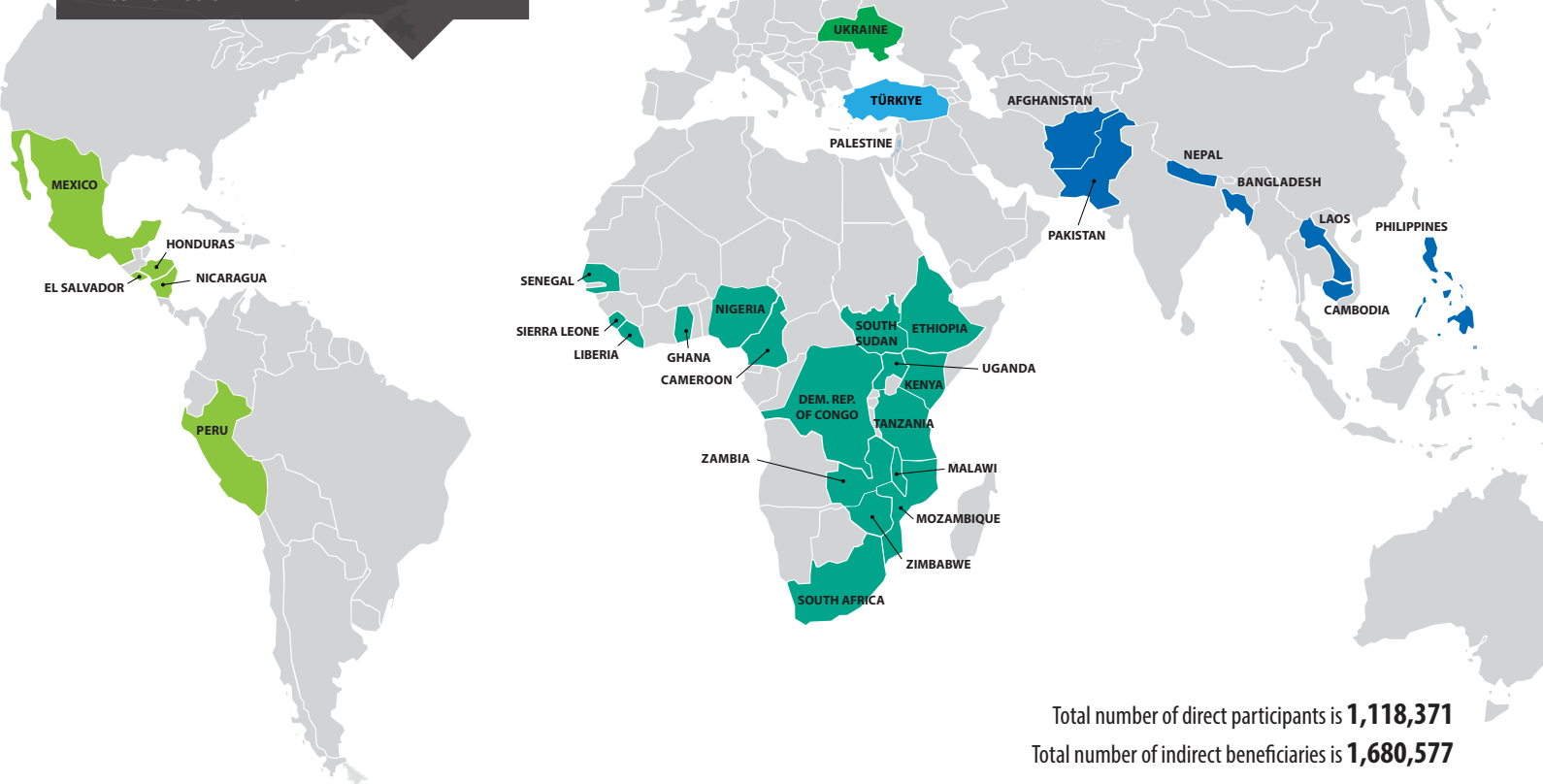

World Vision Canada: Access to Justice for Adolescent Girls Who are Hard-of-Hearing , Mozambique

ACCOUNTABLE DEVELOPMENT WORKS

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO AND SIERRA LEONE | \$17,733

Educating Street Children

This project will provide funding for three years of schooling for orphans and abandoned children. This includes the costs of operating our own primary school, making tuition payments for those attending other schools, university tuition, and covering the uniforms and other costs associated with the school.

ADRA CANADA

KENYA | \$9,833

Building Resilience Against Crisis Effects: PART 2 (BRACE 2.0)

This project will address short-term and long-term food insecurity issues faced by three farmer groups in Kenya by enhancing access to water for domestic use and crop production. This will further stabilize and increase the consumption of nutritious food and strengthen livelihoods.

REAL HUMANITARIAN (FORMERLY CANADIAN HUMANITARIAN ORGANIZATION FOR INTERNATIONAL RELIEF)

ETHIOPIA | \$7,340

Empowering, Educating & Employing Women in Ethiopia: Comprehensive Vocational Training Programs

This project aims to provide 160 undereducated and vulnerable young women living in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, with comprehensive vocational training and education (scholarships, materials, stipends). Hence, they are able to receive a national certificate in the trade of their choice and secure safe and sustainable employment.

CANADIAN LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

PALESTINE | \$50,529

Gender-Responsive and Inclusive Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) in the West Bank (GRIT)

This project aims to reduce poverty in the West Bank and Gaza by providing vocational training to women, including women with disabilities, leading to better employment outcomes. This project will also support the development of policies and structures that will increase the gender responsiveness and inclusivity of the TVET system in the Palestinian territories.

CANADIAN MULTICULTURAL DISABILITY CENTRE INC.

ZIMBABWE | \$10,921

Prevention of Girl Child Absenteeism in Zimbabwean Rural Schools

This project aims to provide sanitary products to upper primary and lower secondary female students to prevent girl child absenteeism in Zimbabwean rural schools through the provision of 3,000 undergarments and 14,400 reusable menstrual pads to 600 female students.

CANADIAN WOMEN FOR WOMEN IN AFGHANISTAN

AFGHANISTAN | \$6,927

Advancing Technology for Education - Darakht-e Danesh Digital Library (DDL)

This project aims to ensure our Technology for Education program continues uninterrupted with enhanced programming, including translating current materials into local languages and adding educational resources, including educational videos and audiobooks. The DDL is an online library for Afghan educators.

CARE CANADA

KENYA, UGANDA, AND ZAMBIA | \$14,099

SHE SOARS (Sexual and reproductive Health & Economic empowerment Supporting Out-of-school Adolescent girls' Rights and Skills)

The Project will deliver adolescent sexual reproductive health and rights, life skills, and financial literacy programming for out-of-school girls and boys aged 10-19 across Kenya, Uganda, and Zambia. The Project will reach 189,922 girls and 50,646 boys directly, 23,067 women and girls and 387,451 men and boys indirectly.

CODE

LIBERIA | \$7,824

Girls' Accelerated Learning Initiative (GALI)

The GALI project in Liberia serves at least 300 over-age adolescent girls in lower grades and struggling to catch up to their peers. They participate in a daily after-school program providing small group tutoring and life skills lessons delivered by primarily female-trained teachers, also equipped with additional learning materials.

CUSO INTERNATIONAL

CAMEROON | \$12,380

TechWomen Factory

Cameroon has a highly educated population and has become a destination for corporations outsourcing their IT, yet gender discrimination has limited these opportunities for women. TechWomen Factory is a two-year program to train and mentor 179 women in the ICT field with job-specific skills to help bridge the digital gender divide.

CANADIAN CATHOLIC ORGANIZATION FOR DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE

CAMBODIA | \$34,528

Women's Empowerment for Community Sustainable Development

The overall goal of this project is to empower young women and communities as the agents of change for gender equality and sustainable development in Battambang and Siem Reap provinces, Cambodia. The project will target 4,736 direct beneficiaries.

DOCTORS WITHOUT BORDERS/ MÉDECINS SANS FRONTIÈRES (MSF)

HONDURAS | \$103,167

Sexual and Reproductive Health Care Services in Choloma and San Pedro Sula

This project will help reduce sickness and death in people of reproductive age in Choloma and San Pedro Sula, Honduras, by improving access to sexual and reproductive healthcare and education. MSF will focus on over 6,000 adolescent women, sex workers and LGBTQI+ people. MSF will also work to mitigate unsafe abortion practices.

The Project will improve community health in six villages so they can live more resilient, productive lives and remove themselves from the poverty trap they are in. Mushroom Grow Box Phase II

This project will build on learnings and accomplishments from previous prototyping and testing of innovative zero-waste mushroom cultivation kits to improve food security, nutrition, and income-earning opportunities for Cambodian farmers, especially women. IDE support for this project comes from internal funding through the Paul Polak Innovation Fund.

INTER PARES**EL SALVADOR | \$10,256****Strategic Interventions to Build Momentum on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights**

This project addresses barriers women and girls face in achieving their sexual and reproductive health and asserting their rights. This year 1,720 women and girls are supported to assert their agency and bodily autonomy, control their fertility, and understand their rights, ultimately being able to determine the course of their lives.

KIDS INITIATIVE**KENYA | \$7,081****Borokwony Women's Group – Chicken Project (Lemolo B)**

This sustainable farming project will enhance food security and provide income for women in the Lemolo IDP camp, where about 700 families live. Using incubators, the project will hatch over 1,000 chicks every 21 days for egg production, selling for similar business development, and kept until mature for future sale.

KUWALA CHRISTIAN GIRLS SCHOOL INC.**MALAWI | \$23,221****Enabling Distance Education**

This project will enable Kuwala to provide quality, dependable distance education for students and continuing education for teachers by providing a reliable source of power. With this critical resource, the school will be able to fully utilize the computers to access distance education.

MAKE MUSIC MATTER**TÜRKIYE | \$6,450****Healing in Harmony Gaziantep—Inclusive Music Therapy for Syrian Refugee Children with Special Needs and Their Caregivers**

Healing in Harmony Gaziantep is a two-year project providing psychosocial support to 160 Syrian refugee children with disabilities and their caregivers in Türkiye. Through an innovative approach to music therapy, the children, their families, and their communities will participate in reducing trauma and fostering a culture of empathy and gender inclusiveness.

This project will improve the skills and economic outlook of twenty young women from Kampala, Uganda, by providing government-certified tailoring training in sewing and embroidery, making sewing machines available to participants, and offering business management training and gender support in health and human rights.

Combined with business and life skills training in a supportive environment, YAP concludes in certification and employment, impacting 3,450 people.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE**MEXICO | \$1,400****Green Project Learning Resources**

This project will develop learning resources to support literacy-appropriate teaching materials for use with Tlmacazapa families on the correct use of fuel-efficient cooking stoves and care of residential kitchen gardens and equip Green Team promoters and crew with step-by-step instructions on building ecological cooking stoves from concrete and bricks.

THE PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND**NEPAL | \$17,227****Socio-Economic Empowerment of Marginalized People in Surkhet District**

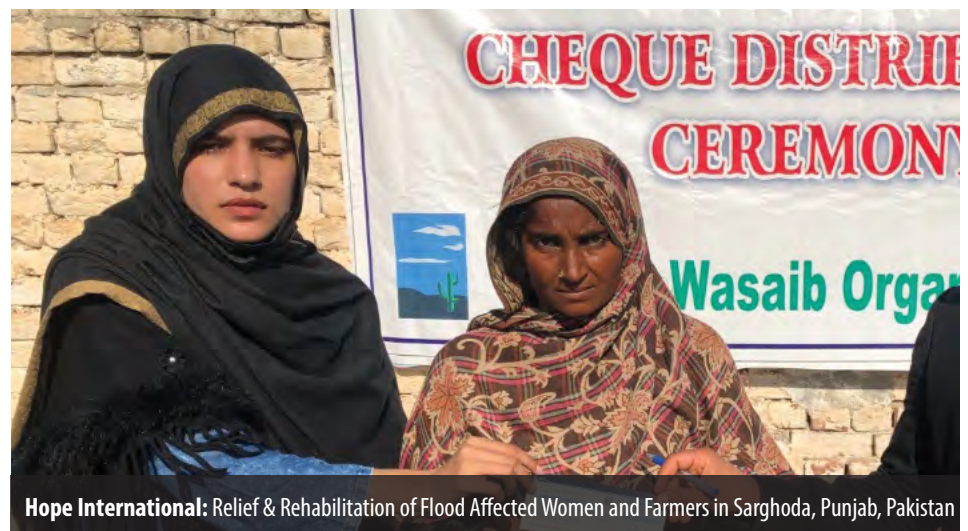

Phoxaykhoun Secondary School

The project will replace a dilapidated school with more adequate, permanent structures. This project allows children in rural villages to learn in a safer, more appropriate learning environment.

THE FANOS LIGHT EDUCATION AND VIRTUES INC.

ETHIOPIA | \$8,000

The Bright Light Project

The project aims to improve the quality of primary education in Sedika, Ethiopia, mainly to improve the quality of early childhood education for girls. In most rural parts of Ethiopia, girls are not encouraged to attend school. As a result, we want to improve girls' access to early childhood education.

UNIVERSITY OF WINNIPEG GLOBAL COLLEGE & MANITOBA WOMEN FOR WOMEN OF SOUTH SUDAN

SOUTH SUDAN | \$8,000

Trauma Healing and Peace Building

This project will provide much-needed trauma healing and reconciliation training for girls and women living in the Rumbek district in South Sudan, where the suicide rate is high. They have traumatic experiences from war and gender-based violence, and their mental health is at stake. The proposed trauma healing workshop will help them heal the wounds, regain strength, and rebuild the community.

A community health worker examines a woman's eye health at a mobile vision centre in India, as part of an innovation testing project supported by the Fund for Innovation and Transformation (FIT). *Empowering Women in Rural India by Debunking Feminine Eye Health Myths* was a project of Norquest College in Edmonton, local partners Operation

Eyesight India and Rotary Eye & ENT Hospital. They tested a two-pronged innovation directly impacting more than 27,000 people in 15 villages, including 12,974 women and girls, by providing access to eye health services and improving community capacity to address the specific barriers to eye health among women and girls.

The context – Nearly 25% of the world's visually impaired live in India. Of the 9.2 million who are blind, over 80% could have had their vision saved with early detection and simple treatment. Despite the Government of India's support for eye health care, members of India's most disadvantaged communities, such as rural women, remain least likely to access eye health services. There are also many stigmatizing myths about women's eye health needs.

The results and impact – The innovation test successfully addressed gender inequities and myths linked to negative eye health outcomes for women and girls while increasing access to eye health services. 90% of the village residents were educated on eye health and screened for eye health ailments, while cataract surgery was provided to 39 women, increasing access from 14% to 100%. Most importantly, by the end of the 12-month testing period, all 15 targeted villages were declared free of avoidable blindness.

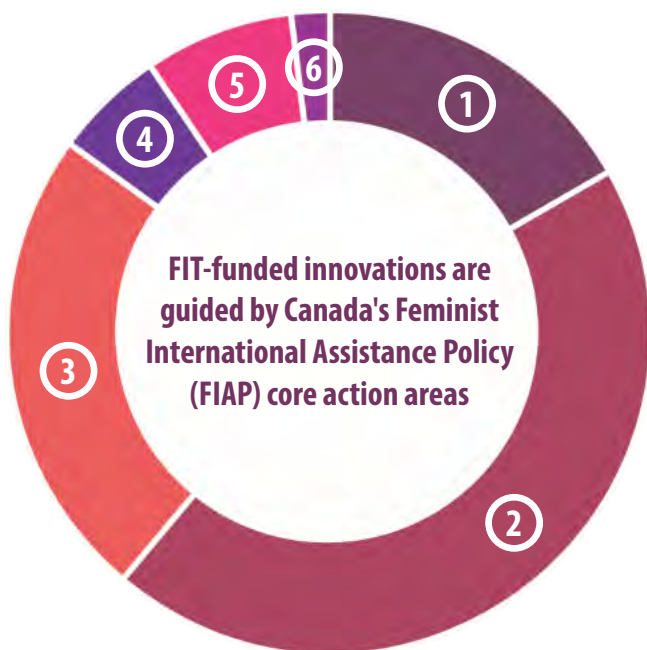

FIT panel at the UN Commission on the Status of Women (NGO CSW67)

Attendees from around the world joined FIT’s virtual panel, Innovative Solutions in Education Delivery to Empower Women and Girls, that explored approaches to support women teachers and girls in tackling educational challenges. FIT-funded organizations Alitus Femina (Canada and Burkina Faso), Canadian Teachers’ Federation and The Gambia Teacher’s Union shared how their innovations are using technology to: empower women teachers through professional learning communities; create safer learning environments for girls as well as reduce and prevent the practice of Sexually Transmitted Grades (STGs). Both testing projects aimed to affect policy, raise awareness of harmful practice of gender-based discrimination and violence, and show how a multi-pronged approach advances gender equality in educational settings.

Alitus Femina used technology to make a taboo subject public and engage all interested parties

- A digital app allows students to report anonymously.
- Students share their experience about STGs and supports are provided.

Canadian Teachers’ Federation used technology to amplify the typical mentoring model

- Technology created safe spaces, a timely response, supportive networks and mentorship for young women teachers.
- Virtual mentorship closed the typical isolation gap.

Representing over 350 diverse civil society organizations, the ICN provides a national forum in which the Councils collaborate for improved effectiveness of the sector and identify common priorities for collective action. As leaders in public engagement and rooted in communities from coast to coast to coast, the ICN provides a platform for bringing regional knowledge and priorities to the national level. The ICN delivers programming to build relationships and strengthen capacities, particularly in areas related to Canada's Feminist International Assistance Policy (FIAP) and to advance the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Some ICN highlights from 2022-2023 include:

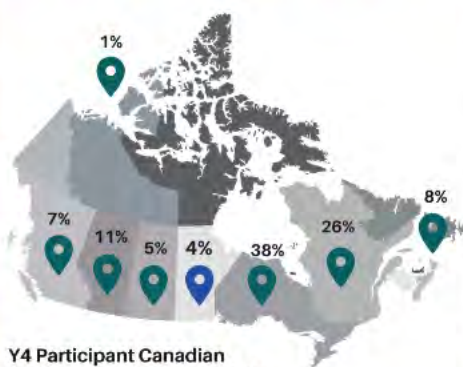
- ✦ Produced a research paper - Towards a Decolonial, Anti-racist and Feminist Public Engagement in November 2022

1. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING AND SUMMARIZATION



The Paul LeJeune Volunteer Service Award was established in 2001 to recognize volunteers who have contributed greatly to MCIC.

Paul LeJeune was a powerful advocate for people with disabilities in Canada and globally and maintained a strong vision of what it means to live independently. He was a valued member of MCIC's Overseas Projects Committee from 1992 until his death in 1997. It was primarily due to Paul's insight that MCIC's development principles include a strong commitment to the inclusion of people with disabilities.

The 2022 Paul LeJeune Volunteer Service Award was presented to **Jason Carkner**.

He was first elected to the Board in 2015 and served until 2021. Jason quickly became a very engaged and active Board member. Serving on the Executive for five of his six years. He was Secretary for two years and then served as President for his last three years. He was on the Policy committee for all six years and, also served on the Personnel, FIT, Finance, Nominations and Strategic Planning Committees. During his time on the Board, Jason initially worked for the Mennonite Central Committee and then was hired by Canadian Lutheran World Relief, where he is Director of Programs. Jason also became a father two times while serving on the Board, so he was not only a dedicated MCIC Board member but a very engaged father, who took parental leave to care for his children.
