### Barefoot Skateboarders

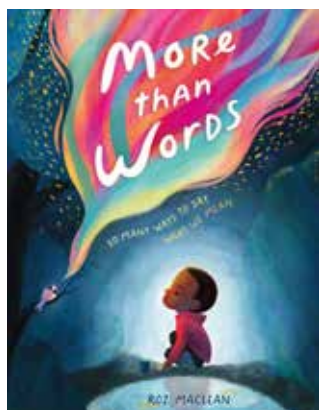
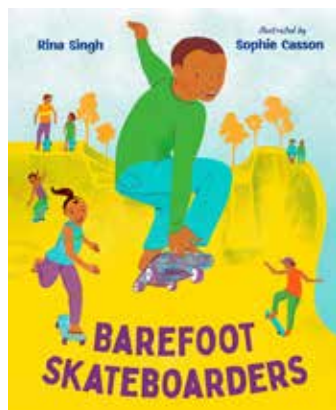
 By Rina Singh & illustrated by Sophie Casson

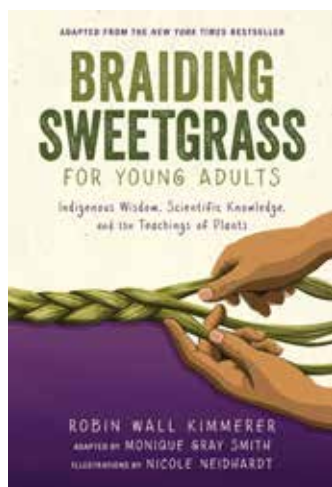
## GRADES 7-9

### Everything Is Fine Here: A Novel

Eighteen-year-old Aine Kamara's story confronts the harsh realities of love, identity, and family in Uganda, a country with severe anti-LGBTQ+ laws. When Aine's sister returns home with her girlfriend, Aine faces conflicting truths about family, faith, and herself.

By Britt Wray

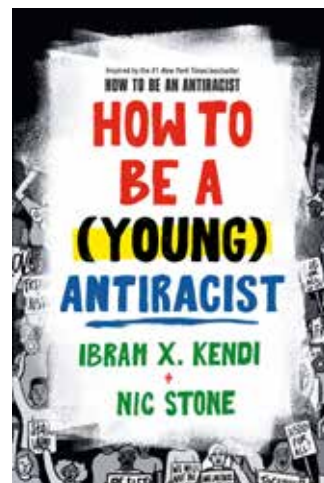
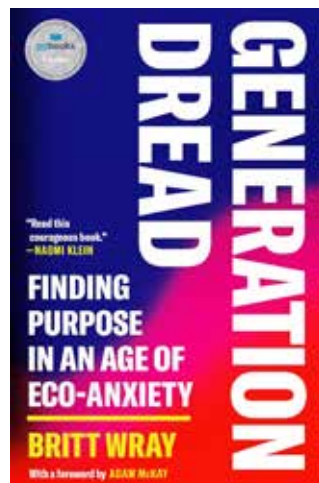
