



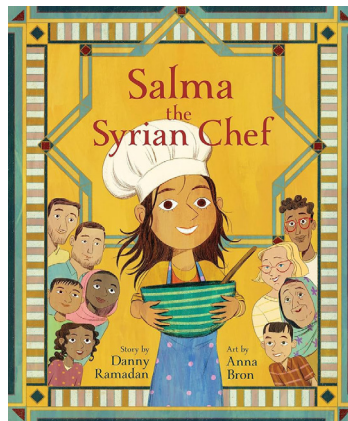
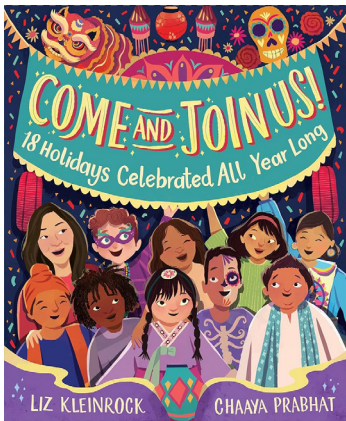

Sail Me Away Home

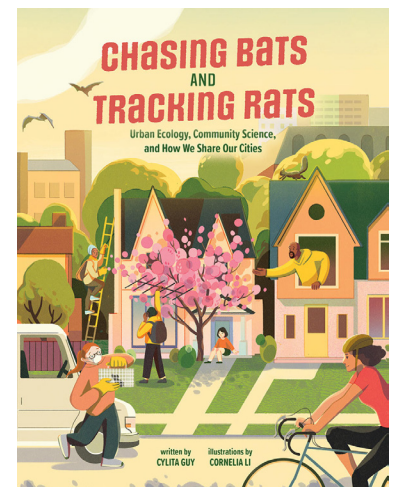

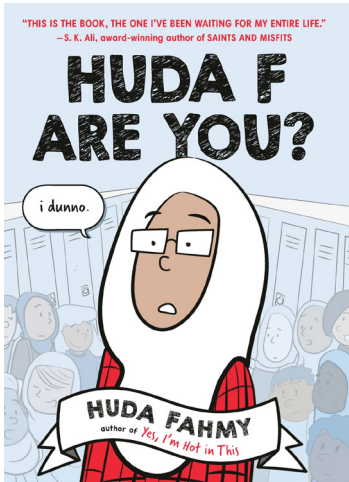

Love Letters for Joy

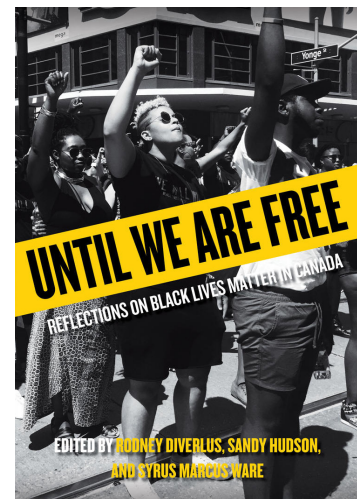
